The theory of surplus value is irrelevant in a society that considers every human worker expendable and replaceable.

The handshake, the pat on the back, a meal with family and friends, a day at the ballpark, attending a show, and other similar forms of human interactions that provide us comfort and facilitate bonding are now a source of anxiety. Anxiety is a catalyst for change, and change, though necessary and inevitable, is never

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easy and often is dreadful. Change means having to give up old ways for new ways. The old ways provide us with a comfort zone. Nobody wants their comfort zone to be rattled. But sooner or later our comfort zone does get rattled, and change occurs. We can either resist it or embrace it. Either way the result is the same.

We are subject to economic and social forces that are beyond our ability to control. These forces operate according to rules that we cannot even begin to fathom. Some try to make sense out of these forces, but all their efforts fail. Some even try to impose their theories on others, with disastrous results. Beware of the politician who claims to have all the answers. That, however, is easier said than done. People are craving for answers, and when someone comes forward and offers an answer, people will respond. They hope it is the right answer, the one that will deliver the security and peace of mind that all of us want, even if it based on an illusion.

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
