Hackmore School for the Vocational Arts where he was taught how to make shoes. In 1912 Van Olson joined the merchant marines as a seaman cobbler and traveled the world making shoes for his fellow sailors. During his travels he was exposed to the teachings of the famous Hindu Indian prophet, sage and notorious womanizer and drug pusher Swami Pashavandavili who introduced Van Olsen to the core principles that became the foundation of modern political science. The Swami also bestowed upon Van Olsen a new name, Berku Kowata Witwadani which in Sumerian means the One Who Knows Everything. Soon after, Van Olsen shortened his new name to Berkowitz. Berkowitz studied under the Swami for five years, during which time he learned the ways of the human female gender and acquired the knowledge that prepared him for the greatness that was to come his way as the founder of the discipline known today as Political Science. Berkowitz died on July 4, 1997, at the age of 104. He died while singing I'm a Yankee Doodle Dandy at Yankee Stadium where he was attending a baseball game. That also applies to Berkowitz's alter ego, Professor Leo Vandyke.<sup>4</sup> Professor Vandyke is the founder and chairman of the Department of Liberal Studies at Harvard University. In 2023 the US government awarded Professor Vandyke a \$90 billion grant to study the relevancy of liberal studies in today's modern economy. Last week Vandyke published a 43-volume report that proved completely that liberal studies are not only relevant in today's' modern economy but that without liberal studies all civilization would crumble into dust. Berkowitz transcends time. He is a spirit that inspires and empowers all who are champions for social justice. Professor Arnold J. Saperstein, Director Emeritus, Political Science Department, Harvard University, writes, "Berkowitz is social justice and social justice is Berkowitz. The two are synonymous and is a
